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EurEau



- ~ EurEau has been the voice of Europe's water sector since 1975
- Our members are 32 national associations of water services from 29 European countries
- We represent drinking water and waste water operators – from the public and private sector
- ~ We engage with EU policy makers to ensure the protection of public health and the environment as well as the sustainability and the affordability of water services



ANNUALLY

The European water sector's turnover is 86 billion euros.



INVESTMENT

We invest 52% of this - 45 billion euros - into renewing infrastructure.

Recast: Drinking Water Directive



- ~ 1 February 2018: legislative proposal (COM)
- ~ Answer to the first ECI Right2Water (2013)
- ~ In line with the implementation of the SDG 6
- ~ Designed around 5 policy options:
 - 1. Art.5 + I Annex I: review of quality parameters
 - 2. Art.7: Introduction of **Water Safety Plan** approach
 - 3. Materials and products in contact with drinking water
 - 4. Art.13: Access to drinking water for all
 - 5. Art.14: Information to consumers

Positive elements of the proposal



- ~ **Update of quality parameters** after almost 20 years
- ~ Introduction of compulsory **risk-based approach** (WHO Water Safety Plan concept)
- ~ Introduction of hazard assessment for water bodies: finally link and synergies between **WFD and DWD**!
- Provisions on risk assessment in the domestic distribution systems
- Idea of realizing access to water for all in line with the UN SDG 6
- Reduce plastics and switch to a circular economy
- Information on quality to the public to create awareness

... to be improved: Quality parameters



- ~ Art.5 + Annex I: Follow *closely* the **recommendations of the WHO** for parameters and parametric values.
- Indicator parameters to be maintained as provided for in the table C in Annex I of Directive 98/83/EC
- ~ Why? Play a fundamental role in the control of processes carried out in drinking water production and the acceptability of tap water for consumers.
- ~ parametric values be set according to the precautionary principle, extra time after the end-date for transposition should be granted.







Sampling frequencies



- ~ EurEau questions the addedvalue of the new sampling frequencies
- ~ EurEau's estimate of additional costs for monitoring
 - total extra spending all over Europe for analytical monitoring only is expected to be around 3 billion euros per year.
 - not including the costs of sampling and the investments needed to comply with the new parameters
 - EurEau believes these resources could be spent more effectively.





Derogations & remedial actions



Derogations: flexibility mechanisms are needed to allow for a smooth implementation according to realistic timelines.



- Esp. parameters where values have been set based on the precautionary principle or are indicators an exceedance does not cause automatically such a potential danger.
- Competent health authorities are best placed to assess the situation,
- evaluate the extent to which the exceedance of the parametric value constitutes a potential danger to human health,
- take the subsequent appropriate remedial actions, including the decision to inform the public.







Risk-based approach


















- ~ EurEau supports **link** between the **DWD** and the Water Framework Directive (**WFD**)
- ~ proposal raises issues in terms of **shared responsibilities**:
 - \sim Member States, water operators, property owners
- ~ **Member States responsibility** in protecting drinking water resources **to be clearly spelled out in the article**
- ~ Only MS have **legal means** to enforce **preventive or mitigation measures in the catchment areas**
- ~ Supply risk assessment to be carried out by all suppliers within 6 years after transposition - review and update: whenever necessary and at least once every 6 years

Materials in contact with drinking water

FurFau

- ~ EurEau **regrets the deletion of art. 10** of Directive 98/83/EC.
- ~ In particular, the migration of substances and the enhancement of microbial growth are important criteria for the suitability of materials that are in contact with drinking water in order to effectively protect public health.
- ~ EurEau calls for establishing **EU-wide minimum hygienic requirements** for
 materials in the DWD while maintaining
 the **link** between the **DWD** and the
 Construction Products Regulation (**CPR**)








SDG 6, transparency, information



- ~ Art.13: Access, affordability and availability are all dimensions of the human right to water.
- ~ Art. 14: EurEau favours **transparency** and back the European Commission's intention to make consumers aware of the good quality of tap water in Europe to **increase consumers' confidence**.
- Do not lose the focus on water quality aspects.
- to carry out the obligation to ensure that information is made available requires extra resources
 - these are not accounted for in the Impact Assessment.





Summary




- ~ This directive is of utmost importance for European water services to provide healthy and affordable drinking water to consumers.
- Various elements of the European Commission's proposed text need improvement to make the Directive legally sound and implementable in an efficient and effective way.

~ **1 February 2018**: Commission published draft proposal

~ ...

- ~ **16 May 2018**: rapporteur Michel Dantin (EPP) presents his draft report
- ~ **18 May 2018**: Draft presidency compromise text
- ~ **7 June 2018**: 1st discussion of report in ENVI committee: rapporteur, shadow-rapporteurs, DG Environment
- ~ **13 June 2018**: deadline for amendments
- ~ **25 June 2018**: Environment Council meeting *Working Party Environment meets twice a months to discuss proposal -> report*
- ~ **10 September 2018**:vote in ENVI committee
- ~ October 2018: vote in EP plenary

- ~ EurEau-committee 1 Drinking water: proposal DWD = priority topic

- ~ 9 May 2018: dedicated **Workshop** on DWD proposal
- ~ 10 May 2018: EurEau's **amendments**
- ~ 18 May 2018: GA approved EurEau DWD-position
- ~ 16 May 2018: **Intergroup meeting** MEPs, Director General of DG Env, Bulgarian presidency
- ~ 7 June 2018: **breakfast debate** on materials in contact with drinking water
- ~ 11 July 2018 (?): EurEau meeting to discuss amendments tabled by EP
